Mr. Baker,

Thank you for your December 7, 2021, letter to Administrator Regan. I am the Director of the Radiation Protection Division and am writing to address your concerns.

The EPA sets protective limits on the ionizing radiation in the environment that comes from human use of radioactive elements such as uranium. Congress has not granted the EPA any statutory authority to regulate visible light or non-ionizing radiation that is emitted from electrical devices, including LEDs. For that reason, the EPA does not regulate artificial light, radiation from LEDs, or other visible electromagnetic radiation, and we do not maintain experts in this field.

While this subject is outside the scope of what the EPA has the authority to address, we can point you in the direction of some resources that may be helpful.
